HOW WILL THE CURRICULUM BE DELIVERED?

For the first term we will be adopting a continuous provision style of learning to support the children with their transition into Key Stage One and further consolidate their knowledge and understanding of the EYFS curriculum. Learning will gradually become more formal to meet the expectations of Year I. Our learning will focus on both the Year I curriculum and the EYFS framework.



WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN EYFS AND YEAR I?

During continuous provision the main differences between Year I and EYFS will be:

- Children are expected to complete an activity (to their best standard) for each subject (writing, teacher directed activity, maths, topic/science). They will receive a lolly stick to add into their personal rainbow when they have completed these. The activities for each subject changes every few days/weekly and there are also many other activities for the children to choose throughout the week.
- Children will attend most whole school assemblies
- Outdoor area will be open for shorter, select times rather than all day
- The children will receive more regular (gradually increasing in time) whole class teaching inputs.
- The children will have a morning and afternoon play in addition to lunchtime.
- Children will have snack during their morning playtime.
- If you would like your child to have school milk, please ensure that you add them onto the milk list.

Step Into the Past

ENGLISH

This year our stories will be focusing on people who help us. We will be reading Rapunzel and Zog and the Flying Doctors. Throughout the term we will be writing to inform and persuade. We will also focus explicitly on Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar, Phonics and reading skills <u>through the use of</u> book studies and Complete Comprehension.

MATHEMATICS

In Maths, we will be mainly focusing on place value, addition and subtraction. The children will have lots of opportunities to explore different resources to support their learning both within the classroom and the outdoor area.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

We will be focusing on Understanding Christianity. The two big questions we are going to reflect on are: 'What do Christians believe God is like?' and 'Why does Christmas matter to Christians?'

SCIENCE

This term, the children will be learning about the different seasons and the weather associated with these. We will also be focusing on the names of human body parts and how we use them.

MFL: SPANISH

This term we will be introducing Spanish to the children for the first time. They will be learning how to say greetings, what we might find in a park and how to <u>count</u>. <u>up</u> to 10.

Y1 Learning Experience Autumn Term 2023

Our Big Question: How can a community change things for the better?

HISTORY and GEOGRAPHY

During Autumn term 1 we will be focusing on our local community and the different roles people <u>have to</u> help others. We will be thinking about their jobs and the help they give. In Autumn term 2 we will be learning about how nursing has changed over time and important figures throughout history that have impacted this.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

In PE this term, we will be exploring different ways to travel and balance following the REAL PE curriculum.

COMPUTING

In Computing, we will be following the Purple Mash units Lego Builders, Maze Explorers and Animated Story Books. The children will learn skills such as following algorithms, writing code and adding text and pictures to online storybooks.

Supporting your child at home

We expect all children to read <u>everyday</u>. In addition to learning spellings and maths you may also wish to enrich their theme learning with other experiences. Here are some ideas of things you could do:

- TERM 1
 - Talk to a family member or family friend about their job. How does it help the local community? Could you email
 in a photo and a speech bubble explaining why they like their job? You may prefer to interview (video) your family
 member and share it with the class.
 - Can you draw a picture and write about which job you would like to have when you're older and why? Take a photo of this and send it in to school.
 - Could you use construction to build a person/place or vehicle linked to people who help in your community? Take a photo of this and send it in to school.

TERM 2

- Talk to a family member/friend that works in a hospital. How do they help our community? You could record their interview and send it into school.
- Create a timeline from pictures/written facts to tell us how hospitals have changed over time. You could bring this into school to show us!
- Design a hospital from construction materials. What areas would your hospital need? Could you take a photo and send it into school?

Please feel free to explore your own ideas and your child's interests. This can be shown through research, using the internet (safely!), making books, posters, information leaflets, models etc. Visits to places related to the topic can also be brilliant ways to inspire learning, especially if they gather information, pictures and artefacts and share them back in class.

This homework is optional so you can do as little or as much as you like and there is no deadline so you can do pieces throughout the term and bring it in.





smell	You smell using your nose. Your nose can tell if things smell nice or not nice.






STATUTORY ASSESSMENTS

Children will take part in a Phonics Screening Check at the end of Year I. This is to assess their segmenting and blending skills for all of the phase 2 - 5 phonemes that they will have been taught throughout their two years at Hayfield Cross. The children will receive a pass/did not pass slip with their end of year report to inform parents on their progress. If they did not pass the phonics screening check in Year I, they will be required to retake it in Year 2. We will be running a Parent Phonics Workshop during Autumn Term with more information on Phonics. A date will be sent out with this soon.



READING



- Each week your child will be allocated a school reading practice book. This book will focus on developing your child's individual reading skills and will be an opportunity for children to consolidate the sounds and words that they have been learning in Phonics that week. It is vital that your child reads this book five times per week.
- In addition to this, children will also receive a weekly reading for pleasure sharing book from our school library. This book is not a book that your child has to read independently. It can be shared with an adult, used as a bedtime story and/or as a tool for developing comprehension skills such as making predictions, discussing events and raising questions about what they have read, seen or heard in the book.
- Please note, in the first two weeks of Year I children will receive a reading for pleasure book only whilst we complete individual phonic and reading assessments. Once these have been completed your child will then receive their first book linked to their phonics and this will be changed weekly on a Friday. In the meantime, if you would like to access reading materials alongside the reading for pleasure book you can continue to access the eBooks that were allocated to your child whilst they were in Reception.

PE

PE will take place every Wednesday afternoon.

Please ensure that children have the correct PE kit (please refer to uniform page on the website) and that all kit is labelled with your child's name. PE kits should be kept in a drawstring PE bag.

Some lessons are outside so suitable clothing should be in school and should all be clearly labelled. Please bring a water bottle to school each day. The children can also take these out for PE.

Please ensure your child is able to get changed independently.

Earrings – Earrings must be taken out for PE or covered with tape that the children must do independently.
